



AN ALLIANCE BETWEEN BLACK FAITH-BASED ORGANIZATIONS AND CLINICIANS



- ☐ Black individuals, particularly those in the southern United States, are disproportionately affected by HIV.
- ☐ Black faith-based organizations (FBOs) have long been recognized as important partners for delivering healthrelated interventions.
- ☐ New Orleans, Louisiana has one of the highest rates of HIV in the United States.
- ☐ Saving Souls, Healing Bodies: Faith-Based HIV Outreach to Black Communities in New Orleans was designed to tackle this issue by educating clergy, congregants, and clinicians in New Orleans and offering health screenings at local church-based health fairs.

with clergy attending the annual meeting of the associated churches and through local outreach




SCHEDULE

community health fairs in 4 key churches in New Orleans area focused on HIV, hypertension, and diabetes screening




RECRUIT

congregants at associated churches and clinicians serving those neighborhoods



EDUCATE


recruited clinicians about HIV prevalence and care outcomes in Black population, PrEP, and barriers to care



REFER

congregants to neighborhood clinicians through onsite scheduling and linkage coordinators


CLINICIAN EDUCATIONAL IMPACT



264 clinicians (physicians, NPs, PAs, pharmacists) joined webcasts to learn about the prevalence of HIV in the Black community and how to screen, prevent and treat HIV

92% of learners stated

they would consider




PATIENT LINKAGE TO CARE


Community intervention featuring 4 health fairs that reached 309 patients





715 Clergy educated 612 Congregants educated






LIVE/FACEBOOK STREAM

Initiative led to:

√ 526 health screenings (ie, HIV, diabetes, hypertension, hyperlipidemia, syphilis, hepatitis C)

✓ 132 HIV/STI tests

CONCLUSIONS

By collaborating with FBOs, expert faculty, and a local health care system, we provided a safe environment to have an honest discussion regarding HIV among clergy, clinicians, and congregants, reducing HIV stigma. This proof of concept can provide a model for outreach to other FBOs.
